In March this year, Pope Francis travelled to Iraq to reinforce his message of interfaith tolerance. Speaking at a gathering at the ruins of Ur (the traditional birthplace of Abraham), he urged Iraq's Muslim and Christian religious leaders to put aside their ancient animosities and work together for peace. "From this place, where faith was born, from the land of our father Abraham, let us affirm that God is merciful and that the greatest blasphemy is to profane his name by hating our brothers and sisters," he said, "Hostility, extremism and violence are not born of a reliaious heart: they are betrayals of religion." Despite the challenges that Covid has posed it has been a blessing of sorts, showing us that tolerance is vitally important for our survival. For a world in the shadows of 9/11, the work of interreligious dialogue has never been more important than it is now. Authentic dialogue doesn't mean to water down truth or to ignore major differences but to rediscover our common humanity. Tolerance and compassion are qualities of fearless people. We must learn to live together as brothers or perish together as fools (Martin Luther King Jr).

In our Gospel, the disciples also learn tolerance! Jesus has just been told that a mysterious stranger has been casting out demons in his name. His disciples tried to stop the stranger because he wasn't a member of their exclusive club. Just as Moses reacts positively towards Eldad's and Medad's prophesying in the camp, so Jesus praises the stranger for his good works under the radar. Would that all the Lord's people were prophets and that the Lord would put his spirit on them! Leave the auy alone. What harm is there in letting him continue? Jesus gives us a very handy guideline for discernment: "whoever is not against us is for us." Yet Jesus' broadmindedness also includes a definite note of warning. No sooner does he highlight the importance of inclusion then Jesus spells out the consequences of dangerous moral relativism. If any disciple should put a stumbling block (which in Greek is scandalon, from which we get the modern word scandal) in front of those who would believe in Jesus, it would be better for them to sink like a stone without trace. Into a hell of their own making. Just as well for us that Jesus' talk of mass amputations of limbs and eyes for serious sins committed is only meant for dramatic effect, and not to be taken literally! As the tolerance and compassion of God made visible, Jesus shows the greatest fearlessness in embracing diversity for the sake of universal truth, in the light of the Gospel. Whoever is not against us is for us...

In a world where the current pandemic has revealed the cracks of deep-seated social and political divisions, it's too easy to indulge in tribalism at the expense of tolerance. Perhaps the greatest scandal in both church and state today is fundamentalism, a dualistic, simplistic black and white thinking that can deafen us to the cries of the oppressed as James writes. Throughout history even the most well-meaning of religious and political idealists have done terrible things out of "godly" motives. As if their ends justified the means. As if they alone had a monopoly on the truth. How tolerant are we? Are we like the disciples who excluded the stranger for not being one of them?

Lord, Father of our human family, you created all human beings equal in dignity: pour forth into our hearts a fraternal spirit and inspire in us a dream of renewed encounter, dialogue, justice and peace. Move us to create healthier societies and a more dignified world, a world without hunger, poverty, violence and war.

May our hearts be open to all the peoples and nations of the earth. May we recognize the goodness and beauty that you have sown in each of us, and thus forge bonds of unity, common projects, and shared dreams. Amen.

(Pope Francis, Fratelli Tutti on Fraternity and Social Friendship, 2020)

How willing are we to dialogue with those whose spiritualities and basic worldviews may be different from our own? To pray with those of other faiths and to work with others of goodwill on issues of common concern like Covid means to affirm everything that unites whilst condemning everything that takes away from the common good of the whole human family. To be a steppingstone for others instead of being a stumbling block for them on their journey of faith means to take responsibility for the moral choices that are ours to make, out of an informed conscience. Tolerance is not a sign of weakness but a sign of strength. We must learn to live together as brothers (and sisters) or perish together as fools. In essentials, unity; in non-essentials, freedom; but in all things, charity.

PROLIFE FACTS

In New Zealand, medical drug abortions are increasingly utilised because the procedure is relatively easy to administer. The process begins with taking mifepristone as a tablet, which deprives the pre-nine-week old baby

of nutrition. The second step is to administer misoprostol, which causes the baby to be expelled from the uterus. However, an article by Delgado and colleagues (2018), shows that it is not uncommon for women to have second thoughts about proceeding with the abortion after taking the first pill but prior to taking misoprostol, with 1,668 calls made to an information line inquiring about reversing the abortion procedure across a four year period. Their peer-reviewed study showed that by administering the hormone prostaglandin, up to 68% of pregnancies can be saved, even after taking the first pill, without increasing the risk of birth defects. Family Life International NZ offers further information on the protocols for reversing medical abortions to medical practitioners interested in learning more.
